## Schoke JFS Mobile Food Pantry and Back to School Shop Partnership

Schoke Jewish Family Service had the distinct pleasure of partnering with the Back to School Shop (BTSS) for the 9th Annual Back to School Shop event on Sunday, July 30, 2023. At the BTSS event, elementary school children from low-income families in Stamford selected their own brand new school items in a one day "pop-up" shop where everything was free!

This year, the Schoke JFS Kosher Mobile Food Pantry was there to provide food resources to the 400 families attending the event, making it the largest distribution for Schoke JFS. Leah Schechter, Schoke JFS Chief Program Officer, said, "As a community-focused organization, we look for partners throughout Fairfield County to maximize our impact. Partnering with the Back to School Shop has been an extraordinary opportunity to provide food and services to families in Stamford, and to serve as an example of how collaboration between organizations and the local school districts fulfills our mission of raising up our community to the fullest extent."

The day's events also included two inperson food demonstrations with Dr. Joe Feuerstein of Everyday Health's Condition Kitchen. He provided food samples while sharing healthy tips and recipes using the shelf-stable groceries and produce provided by the Schoke JFS Kosher Mobile Food Pantry. This collaboration of health professionals, Schoke JFS, and the Back to School Shop offered families unique access to support and resources free from the obstacles they might otherwise face.

Co-founder and co-chair of Back to School Shop and Schoke JFS board member, Meryl Japha, said, "We are thrilled Schoke JFS brought their Mobile Food Pantry to this year's Back to School Shop event. In addition to being able to shop for brand new school clothes and supplies at no charge, the families of 400 children had the opportunity to select free food items from the Mobile Food Pantry, to see a cooking demonstration of how to use the items to prepare healthy meals, and to register to receive services from the Mobile Food Pantry on an ongoing basis. The new, full-service satellite office expands our reach in the many towns we serve throughout upper Fairfield County offering services such as in-person counseling, case management, and geriatric care management.

This is an exciting chapter in the agency's 45-year history. Matt Greenberg, Schoke JFS President and CEO, shared, "Schoke JFS is pleased to have been serving clients in Bridgeport, Westport, and throughout upper Fairfield County for over twenty years. In fact, nearly 30% of Schoke JFS' current clients are located in upper Fairfield County. This new office in Fairfield offers us a greater capacity to serve our clients in-person and right in the communities where they live."

in Bridgeport. Janet brings



## All in A Week's Work – A Week in the Life of a Schoke JFS Volunteer

With services across Fairfield County, Schoke JFS is home to a large team of dedicated volunteers. From Pantry Open Hours, to English Café, to weekend Kosher Mobile Food Pantry distributions, volunteers are consistently serving the community throughout the week.

Starting at nine o'clock on Monday morning, the agency is open and ready for both clients and volunteers. By 10:30AM, the Freedberg Family Kosher Food Pantry opens its doors. With the help of staff and volunteers,

the agency's Stamford pantry is able to provide food to countless families during open hours on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays. Schoke JFS clients come to the entrance with empty arms and leave with full bags of groceries. But our pantry volunteers don't stop when open hours are done. During afternoons, additional volunteers help prepare for the next day's pantry operations. At 4:00PM, when volunteers leave the pantry clean, stocked, and ready to serve more families, our





volunteers' day is done.

The Schoke JFS Kosher Mobile Food Pantry also makes its way into the community during the week. With the help of three to five volunteers, the mobile pantry is loaded with food, and then bags are packed on-site to feed dozens of families for one or two distributions each week.

On Wednesday evenings, the sounds of giggles and conversation resound throughout Schoke JFS offices as the conference room becomes a classroom for English Café. From 3:00PM, volunteers help build a space for learning and connection for Ukrainian refugees. While the clinicians of the Schoke JFS team support their clients' professional needs, volunteers are supporting the social and educational needs of even more individuals. By 6:00 PM, the office is rearranged, and the day's pantry hours, mobile pantry distribution, and evening of learning are finally complete.

On Thursday mornings, volunteers pack both Hirsch Kosher Home Delivered Meal program and Shabbat delivered meals for forty clients. By 11:30AM, Stamford volunteers arrive to start deliveries. That afternoon, another volunteer brings meals to Fairfield for more volunteers to deliver throughout upper Fairfield County on Thursdays and Fridays.

And the work isn't over yet! Some weekends may include a Sunday mobile pantry distribution at Congregation Beth El in Norwalk or Congregation B'nai Israel in Bridgeport. Yet another team of volunteers gather to continue the work. Meanwhile in Stamford, families are volunteering as Mitzvah Matches to deliver groceries to homebound clients.

At the end of a full week, over sixty Schoke JFS volunteers have participated in a dozen volunteer opportunities. Their dedication, time, effort, and dependability make them valuable members of the agency's mission and work.

## Learning From Experts: The Schoke JFS Internship Experience

Schoke Jewish Family Service has a skilled staff of licensed clinicians at the helm of our Kuriansky Family Counseling Program , Case Management, and Home Companion programs. It is exciting to have qualified professionals mentoring and guiding the next class of social workers in these fields in addition to everything they offer our clients.

Interns working with Isrella Knopf in the Home Companion Program have the opportunity to complete home visits with our elderly community members, joining intake conversations which will determine how Schoke JFS will support the client and which aide is best matched to the client's needs. Home Companion interns also assist with training and certification programs for prospective aides within the department.

Meanwhile, interns reporting to Hannah Pollack in the Case Management Department fill many different client needs, guiding clients through resources, assisting with application completion, organizing and initiating referrals, and even serving as medical advocates. With opportunities to build relationships with clients and partner agencies alike, Case Management interns gain valuable experience practicing social work in a variety of situations.

Varying slightly, interns in the Counseling Department support a caseload of 5-10 individuals, couples, or family therapy clients. They have the opportunity to facilitate support groups or socialization programs as part of their capstone project. Counseling Department interns

participate in the department's weekly meeting, learning from a team of qualified, licensed clinicians.

### **Actionable Ways to Prevent Cognitive Aging**

Scientists have always recognized the brain develops from infancy to young adulthood. Rather than stagnating in our mid 20s, however, recent studies suggest the brain continues to change throughout adulthood and even into old age.

Neuroplasticity is the process by which our brain continues to create new neurons and make fresh connections between brain cells throughout our lives. If the brain is injured, it can generate new cells and repair itself or create new neural pathways to take over the functions of the injured area. In addition, the brain can make new neural connections within our brain in response to new stimuli and changing environments.

The more we are exposed to new stimuli, the more neural connections our brains make. Neuroplasticity is an exciting concept because it means our brain is continuously growing, and we can attempt to keep it functioning optimally by engaging in new activities.

### Top ways to keep your brain healthy

**Diet:** Eating well contributes to overall brain health. Keeping cholesterol at a healthy level and monitoring our blood sugar helps our brain cells function.





**Exercise:** Physically active people are less likely to experience cognitive declines, enabling our brain to receive appropriate levels of oxygen and nutrients.

**Sleep:** Ensuring you receive the proper number of hours of sleep per night, around seven to nine hours of continuous sleep, helps the brain consolidate memories and allows our body to recharge.

Engaging in mentally stimulating activities – learning new subjects, doing puzzles, or reading – helps you stay sharp and keeps your brain in shape.

### How do you exercise your brain?

Schoke JFS offers a Brain Fitness program that targets various cognitive areas to help stimulate the brain. Run by Dr. Toby Lazarus, group and individual sessions are offered. Wordplay, puzzles, memory games, and problemsolving activities can enhance your brain power and are fun ways to challenge yourself. Strategies for improving your skills are discussed during these sessions, and participants share the most compelling techniques. Finding multiple ways to problem solve and approach tasks improves mental flexibility as well. These interactive programs engage the mind in thoughtful ways, are designed for a range of ages and abilities, and can be adjusted based on the participants. You are never too old or too young to stimulate your brain!
